This is a creative class. The aim of this workshop is to learn how to use Wessex work as a tool to embellish fabric or create a 'new' fabric; samples that demonstrate this process will be compared and discussed. If you haven't designed Wessex stitches before, you will be taken through this process so you can learn to design and use your own patterns to create something truly unique.

# **#222:** Using Wessex as a Decorative Element

Total costs: 2-day workshop fee: \$200 + kit cost: \$20 = \$220

By the end of the workshop you will have started on your final piece and leave with a good foundation and confidence to use Wessex in your future stitched pieces.

### The kitset will include:

- Waste canvas a selection of three different grid sizes
- Gridded paper for designing patterns and notes
- Colour photocopies of the diagrams that I used for my designs

You will need to bring:

- Fabric big enough for your project or at least 3x A4 in size as you
  will be given 3x A4 pieces of different count waste canvas to work
  with.
- Threads bring a selection of your favourite threads.
   Look for different textures, types (cotton/wool/linen/silk etc),
   stranded cotton, Perle etc and thicknesses. It would be good to have at least one of bright, dark and light, maybe sparkly if you have some.
- Hoops either the Nurge No2 or a 22cm circular one are ideal.
- Needles A selection of sharps including embroidery/crewel needles sizes 1-5.
- Pliers these can be helpful to pull needles through
- Tweezers/stitch unpick useful for removing waste canvas threads
- Your usual sewing kit including sharp scissors (fabric and thread), thimble, pins, magnifying glass, lighting etc
- Paper and pen for making notes
- Felt pens or coloured pencils in a similar colour to your threads (only if you have them; some will be available to use)
- Gay Eaton's 'Wessex Stitchery' book (if you have one)
